FAVORITE FLORA: AGAVE VILMORINIANA - OCTOPUS AGAVE



Agave vilmoriniana (Octopus Agave) is a native of northwest Mexico. In its native environment, it is typically found clinging to the side of canyons, resembling giant spiders on a wall. However, here in the southwest, we use this agave to create a wonderful sculptural effect with the long, slender leaves and curved shape. This plant is perfect as an accent alone or in groups. It can be placed in areas such as patios, entries or around pools. It can also be used as a container plant, just make sure your container is big enough.

This native to northwest Mexico enjoys full sun to partial shade with deep waterings every month or two during the

summer. It can withstand our freezing temperatures to about 20 degrees F with no damage. It grows to 3-4 feet high and 5-6 feet wide with gray-green spineless leaves that resemble an octopus. Be sure to space these about 6 feet apart or away from walls as these plants are not to be pruned.

Unlike other agaves, the Octopus Agave is relatively short-lived averaging 6-8 years before flowering. When the yellow flowers do appear, the stalk can be up to 15 feet tall. After the flowers fade they are replaced by a heavy set of the next generation plants. The original plant dies shortly thereafter so plan ahead with a replacement.

Another interesting fact, in its native Mexico, the dead plants are made into brushes with built-in soap which foams in water. The cleaning agent is naturally formed in the dry leave. These brushes can sometimes be found for sale on the Mexican west coast.
