FAVORITE FLORA: TRACHELOSPERMUM JASMINOIDES - STAR JASMINE



Would you like a border plant that smells great in the spring and stays green all winter long? Then Trachelospermum jasminoides is for you. Also known as Star Jasmine, this evergreen plant is a native to China but highly cultivated here in the United States. It grows in all but the coldest of climates and blooms from spring into the summer.

It can be used as a groundcover, shrubby plant or a climber to decorate walls. Its dark evergreen leaves provide a spectacular backdrop for the very fragrant, white, star shaped flowers. Grows anywhere from 20 to 30 feet with support. Without support it will grow to a height of about 2 feet but spreads to approximately 10 feet wide. Star Jasmine prefers well-drained soil and fertilizing before spring growth and after flowering. This plant requires very little maintenance. Pruning as needed to maintain shape. Be wary of the milky sap from the cut ends as they can cause skin irritation. While this plant is extremely versatile and fragrant it is best to plant it away from play areas for children or pets.
