FAVORITE FLORA: CYCAS REVOLUTA - SAGO PALM



Did you know the Sago Palm isn't a palm at all? It's a Cycad. There are about 60 different species of Cyca around the world with the Cycas Revoluta (Sago Palm) being the most widely cultivated. This plant is native to Japan but due to its easy cultivation and drought tolerance it can be seen often in the desert.

Adding a lush look to any desert landscape, the sago has a large crown of dark green, glossy, palm-like evergreen leaves that grow to about 3 feet long. This slow growing plant grows well in full shade to morning sun with water every week or two during the warm season and little to no water during the cool season. It thrives in sandy soils and is low maintenance. Due to its slow growth habit it is capable of living for 50 to 100 years possibly more. It can reach up to 10 feet high and 3 to 6 feet wide.
