FAVORITE FLORA: DASYLIRION WHEELERI - DESERT SPOON

The Desert Spoon is a tough accent plant that works well if you need an architectural plant form. It will take our desert heat and drought without much care. This plant stands better as a specimen rather than in large groups. Its long narrow leaves grow to about 3 feet and have sharp curved thorns along the entire leaf blade. Don't plant it near a walkway or fire hydrant and don't stick your hand in it! Older plants grow to about



6' wide and will eventually develop a short trunk. The bloom is quite spectacular rising 9' – 15' above the plant. Small white (male) to pinkish (female) flowers are followed by straw colored seeds that make the tall stalk look like a giant sheaf of grain. The flower spikes can be left on for a long period of time.
