Favorite Flora: Ulmus parvifolia- Chinese Elm- By Matt Durham



on every continent except for Antarctica. The Chinese Elm has the hardest wood out of all the elms which lends itself nicely to uses such as tool handles, furniture, cabinets and flooring.

Ulmus parvifolia is a tough tree that can be grown in full sun and questionable soils. It is highly resistant to a variety of pests and diseases such as the Dutch Elm disease. This tree is best used in spaces where its branches can spread such as along streets and in plazas. The Chinese elm is even a great choice as a bonsai due to its toughness and high tolerance to pruning.

Everyone loves a large shade tree in Las Vegas during the summer and the Chinese Elm (Ulmus parvifolia) is a great selection. This semi-evergreen tree has an upright growth habit of branches reaching 30 to 40 feet in height and spread with larger trees reaching up to 60 feet. Small serrated leaves adorn the branches in all but the coldest months. The late summer flowers are insignificant and the bright green early spring leaves are more showy than the dull yellow fall colors. However, the multi colored, peeling bark on the trunk adds a bit of interest when up close to this tree. As the name suggests the Chinese Elm is native to China, India, Taiwan, Japan North Korea and Vietnam. It was introduced to Europe in the 18th century and now grows
