Favorite Flora: Rhus ovata- Sugar Bush- By Matt Durham



This month's favorite flora is the Sugar Bush (Rhus ovata). It is an evergreen shrub native to Northern Baja California, Southern California and Central Arizona. This large shrub, growing 8-12 feet tall and wide, has large, glossy, dark green leaves. The leaves are aromatic and can even be used to make a lemonade-like drink. Sugar Bush blooms in the spring with clusters of white to pink colored flowers, eventually turning in to groups of red berries. This plant can grow in a variety of light conditions from full sun to heavy shade. Once established it can also tolerate temperatures down to at least 10 degrees.

Sugar Bush is a large shrub and should be used where it has room to grow. It can be used as a screen, informal hedge or backdrop in a landscape. If this shrub does grow too large for its space or develops an unwelcomed form it can tolerate heavy pruning. Care should be taken when pruning this plant as it produces a sap that may cause a rash. Plant with other desert natives such as Agave weberi (Weber's Agave), Red Bird of Paradise (Caesalpinia pulcherrima), and Colorado Four O'Clock (mirabilis multiflora).
