Favorite Flora:

Artemisia tridentata - By Caryl Davies



Artemisia tridentata, Big Sagebrush, is the official state flower of Nevada. It appears on our state's flag as well as in our state's song. It grows across vast areas of the Great Basin Desert and in the desert of several southwest states. This silvery gray-green shrub typically grows to 3-6 feet in height but can grow to 12 feet along rivers or more wet areas. It produces small yellow flowers in the late summer or early fall. Big Sagebrush has a strong aromatic fragrance. You can especially smell it after a rainstorm.

Artemisia tridentata has antiseptic, disinfectant and digestive properties and was used by Native Americans for medicinal purposes including treating headaches, colds, internal bleeding, and disinfecting wounds. The bark was used for weaving mats, starting fires, and the hard, dense wood was used for fires.

Artemisia tridentata is hardy and survives dry conditions and poor soil. No wonder this beautiful shrub became Nevada's state flower... it is tough, durable, and a true survivor. Just like us Nevadans.
